A. HISTORY OF THE SPORT

Tennis originated from a 12th century French game called paume (meaning palm); it was a court game where the ball was struck with the hand. Paume evolved into jeu de paume and rackets were used. The game spread and evolved in Europe. In 1873, Major Walter Wingfield invented a game called Sphairistikè (Greek for "playing ball") from which modern outdoor tennis evolved.

B. CANADA GAMES SPORT HISTORY AND PAST RESULTS

Tennis was part of the inaugural Canada Summer Games in 1969, and has been a regular event over the years.

D. EVENT FORMAT AND RULES OF PLAY

Teams will be divided into two divisions with a fair distribution of teams in each division based on the overall strength of each provincial team.

Seedings of provincial teams will be determined by Tennis Canada, with regard to the overall depth of each team, taking into consideration 2004 year end rankings and all available 2005 National results.

During the first three days of competition, teams will play a round robin, playing all other provincial teams in their respective division to determine an overall provincial team ranking within each division.

Each provincial team tie will be based on playing six matches, as follows:
2 girls singles 2 boys singles
1 boys doubles 1 girls doubles

During Round Robin play, each match (including the deciding seventh match) will be based on playing the best 2 out of 3 sets (no ad scoring) with a 12 point tiebreak at 6 games all. If a third set is required, players will play a 10 point Super Tie- Breaker to determine the 3rd set. During all medal matches, each match will be based on playing 3 sets (no ad scoring) with a 12 point tiebreak at 6 games all.

Scoring will simply be based on 1 point for each match won and the total points earned by all individuals representing their provincial team will be combined to determine the outcome of each team tie.

Final Round Robin standings in each division will be based on the number of team ties won against other provinces.

The rules and regulations of tennis, as published in "The Rules of the Court", will be followed.

No substitutions will be permitted if a player becomes injured and unable to continue for the remainder of the overall competition. (This does not apply to a match in progress, where the injured player would be required to retire).

E. AGE ELIGIBILITY

2 male athletes must be under 16 years of age as of January 1, 2009. (Born in 1993 or later)
2 female athletes must be under 16 years of age as of January 1, 2009. (Born in 1993 or later)

2 male athletes must be under 18 years of age as of January 1, 2009. (Born in 1991 or later)
2 female athletes must be under 18 years of age as of January 1, 2009. (Born in 1991 or later)

F. EQUIPMENT AND TERMINOLOGY

Ace – A ball that is served so well that the opponent fails to touch it with his/her racquet

Alley – The area between the singles and doubles sidelines on each side of the court. The singles court is 4.5 feet wider for doubles by the addition of the alley.

Backhand – If you are right-handed, a backhand is a shot you hit on the left side of your body.

Baseline – The line parallel to the net, which defines the outer-most edge of the court.

Double Fault – The failure of both service attempts to be good. The player who double faults loses a point.

Doubles – When two people play against two other people.

Drop Shot – A very soft shot hit just barely over the net. You hit a drop shot to get your opponent up to the net.

Fault – A served ball that does not land in the proper court.

Foot Fault – Touching the baseline with your foot before making contact with the ball on a serve.

Forehand – If you are right-handed, then the forehand is a shot you hit on the right side of your body.

Game – The part of a set that is completed when one player or team wins four points, or two consecutive points after deuce.

Grip – The way you hold a racquet. There are three standard grips: eastern, continental, and western.

Groundstrokes – Strokes made after the ball has bounced, either forehand or backhand.

Head – The part of the racquet used to hit the ball including the frame and strings.

Instructor/Coach – An individual who teaches tennis.

Junior – A child under the age of 18.

Let – A point played over because of interference. A serve that hits the top of the net but is otherwise good.

Lob – A shot that you hit with any stroke high and deep into your opponent's court. You typically use a lob to get the ball past an opponent when he is at the net.

Match – A match is usually 2 out of 3 sets.

Mixed Doubles – Doubles play in which a male and a female team up to oppose another man and woman.

Overhead – A shot hit over your head while you are at the net.

Passing Shot – A forehand or backhand that is hit past an opponent who is at the net.

Seed – A player's rank in a tournament.

Serve – A stroke, made from over your head, which you use to start each point.

Service Line – The line parallel to the net, that defines the outer-most edge of the service area.

Set – When a player or team wins six games by a margin of two (i.e. 6-2, 6-4, 7-5).

Singles – When one person plays against one other person.

Tennis Professional – An individual who is a certified tennis coach and has experience in other aspects of the game like administration and club management.

Tie-break – A system used to decide a set when the score is 6-6.

Volley – A shot that you hit before the ball bounces, usually at the net.

There are 12 scoring positions, with points allocated for 1 through 22 as follows:

H. PLAYOFF AND TIE-BREAKING FORMAT

Team Event

Team Tie:

Each provincial team tie will be based on playing six matches, as follows:

2 girls singles 2 boys singles
 1 boys doubles 1 girls doubles

Seventh Match:

In the event that two competing provincial teams have equal point totals, upon completion of the six prescribed matches in a given tie, each team will nominate its preferred mixed doubles team for the seventh and deciding match.

Playoffs:

For the playoffs (at the conclusion of the round robin portion of the competition) the match schedule will be as follows:

Gold/silver and bronze playoffs:

- the team with the best record in pool a (a1) will play the team with the second best record from pool b (b2) in one semi-final match. The team with the second best record in pool a (a2) will play the team with the best record in pool b (b1) in the other semi-final. The winning provincial teams will play for the gold and silver medals with the Losing teams playing for the bronze medal and fourth place.

5th /6th and 7th/8th place playoffs:

- the team with the 3rd best record in pool a (a3) will play the team with the fourth best record in pool b (b4) in one semi-final match. The team with the fourth best record in pool a (a4) will play the team with the third best record in pool b (b3). The winning provincial Teams will play for 5th and 6th place overall, the losing provincial teams will play for 7th or 8th Place overall.

9th/10th place match:

- the teams with the 5th best record in their respective pools overall (after round robin play) will play for 9th or 10th place overall.

11th /12th place match:

- in the case where there are only eleven (11) teams, no 11th /12th place playoff will be played.

Individual Medal Event Tie-Breaking Procedure:

In case of a tie (after round robin play) the following tie-breaking procedure will be followed to determine singles medal participants:

Where two or more players have won an equal number of matches, the final standing will be based on:

- (a) head to head results between or among the players in question; if still inconclusive, then
- (b) the net sets (that is, the number of sets won minus the number of sets lost) between or among the players in question; if still inconclusive, then
- (c) the net games (that is, the number of games won minus the number of games lost) between or among the players in question

Singles medal playoff format: Top half of the draw (quarterfinals):

- the number 1 seed receives a first round bye
 - the number 4 player would play the #5 or #6 player as determined by a coin toss. The loser of this match is out of medal contention.
 - the number 1 seed then plays the winner of this match in the gold/silver playoff.
- The winner of this playoff would play the winner of the other semi final for either the gold or silver medal. The loser would go on to play in the bronze playoff.

Bottom half of the draw:

- the number 2 seed receives a first round bye
 - the number 3 player would play the #5 or #6 player as determined by a coin toss. The loser of this match is out of medal contention.
 - the number 2 seed then plays the winner of this match in the gold/silver playoff.
- The winner of this playoff would play the winner of the other semi final for either the gold or silver medal. The loser of the playoff would go on to play in the bronze medal.

Doubles Event: Tie-Breaking Procedure:

In case of a tie (after round robin play) the following tie-breaking procedure will be followed to determine doubles medal participants:

Where two or more teams have won an equal number of matches, the final standing will be based on:

- (a) head to head results between or among the teams in question; if still inconclusive, then
- (b) the net sets (that is, the number of sets won minus the number of sets lost) between or among the teams in question; if still inconclusive, then
- (c) the net games (that is, the number of games won minus the number of games lost) between or among the teams in question

Gold/silver playoff:

The #1 seed from pool A will play the #4 team. The winner of this playoff will play for either the gold or silver medal. The losing team will play for the bronze medal.

The #2 seed from pool B will play the #3 team. The winner of this playoff will play for either the gold or silver medal. The losing team will play for the bronze medal.

I. ROLE OF OFFICIALS IN SPORT

The referee is the final authority on all questions of tennis law and the referee's decision is final.

In matches where a chair umpire is assigned, the chair umpire is the final authority on all questions of fact during the match.

The players have the right to call the referee to court if they disagree with a chair umpire's interpretation of tennis law.

In matches where line umpires and net umpires are assigned, they make all calls (including foot-fault calls) relating to that line or net. The chair umpire has the right to overrule a line umpire or a net umpire if the chair umpire is sure that a clear mistake has been made. The chair umpire is responsible for calling any line (including foot-faults) or net where no line umpire or net umpire is assigned.

A line umpire who cannot make a call shall signal this immediately to the chair umpire who shall make a decision. If the line umpire cannot make a call, or if there is no line umpire, and the chair umpire cannot make a decision on a question of fact, the point shall be replayed.

In team events where the referee is sitting on-court, the referee is also the final authority on questions of fact.

Play may be stopped or suspended at any time the chair umpire decides it is necessary or appropriate.

The referee may also stop or suspend play in the case of darkness, weather or adverse court conditions. When play is suspended for darkness, this should be done at the end of a set, or after an even number of games have been played in the set in progress.

After a suspension in play, the score and position of players on-court in the match shall stand when the match resumes.

The chair umpire or referee shall make decisions regarding continuous play and coaching in respect of any Code of Conduct that is approved and in operation.

J. FACILITY DESCRIPTION

Victoria Park Tennis Courts, Charlottetown

The Victoria Park Tennis Courts are located in historic Victoria Park along Park Drive and will host Tennis during Week One. Facilities include lighted courts and a clubhouse with change rooms and washrooms. For Games play, two additional courts will be constructed bringing the total to eight.
